III. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

A. PROJECT SUMMARY

Summarize how CDBG funds are proposed to be used:

The purpose of the City of San Marcos Housing Rehabilitation and Emergency Repair Programs is to maintain affordable housing stock in the City. It is the City's intent that this program will benefit low-to-moderate income homeowners and also provide for generational wealth-building by providing an affordable home that can be inherited.

- The purpose of Owner Occupied Housing Rehabilitation is to assist low and moderate income (LMI) homeowners
 in rehabilitating substandard, deteriorated, and dilapidated single-family residential homestead housing to bring
 the housing into standard living conditions.
- The purpose of Emergency Repair is to assist low and moderate income homeowners with repairs of specific issues
 that are causing immediate damage to a single-family residential property, or which are safety hazards. At times,
 houses are too dilapidated to be brought into standard condition under the cost limit of this program. In those
 cases, it is appropriate to provide emergency repair to prevent further damage to the home and to correct safety
 hazards.
- The purpose of Rental Housing Rehabilitation is to assist in rehabilitating or providing emergency repairs to substandard, deteriorated, and dilapidated single family residential housing when the owner has a low to moderate income and the house is occupied by someone other than the owner.

C. LEVERAGED RESOURCES

This program will be administered by two City employees. CDBG funding pays for approximately two-thirds of the cost for the two staff members, and the City's General Fund pays for the rest.

The City also allocated American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding for City-administered housing repair and about \$250,000 remains, to be combined with this CDBG funding for next year's program.

D. ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Once the project is completed, how can its success be measured?

The requested \$350,000 in CDBG funding will provide home repair for approximately seven to ten households. Success is measured by providing those households with safe living environments in good condition, preserving the house for the current owner and future generations.

E. NEED AND JUSTIFICATION

Describe the need for this project. Has the need been increasing in recent years?

The need for this program is increasing as housing stock in San Marcos ages. San Marcos is generally a low to moderate income community, and many homes have been passed down through generations who have struggled to maintain the homes due to their income level. In addition, homes have been impacted by flooding, hail, and wind causing damage to the homes' foundations and roofs — which are extremely important to the longevity of a structure.

The home repair and rehabilitation program is continuously sought out by San Marcos residents. The program held an open application process in 2023 and repaired 18 homes in 2024 using CDBG funding (and an additional 9 with American Rescue Plan Act funding). An additional 5-7 will be repaired in 2025. Staff continue to receive calls about the program even though it is closed for applications, and the waiting list has more than 110 potential applicants who will receive a notification email when the program opens for applications in 2026. The application process will also be marketed to all city residents.

Current Community Initiatives Division staff (Carol Griffith and Lorena Escobar) completely revised the prior CDBG Home Repair and Rehabilitation Program in 2023. At the same time, Southside Community Center decided to focus on other programs, and City Staff took over all program administation. In 2023, staff procured estimators and construction contractors and held a citywide application process. In 2024, staff administered the program with \$860,283 in CDBG funding and \$863,761 in ARPA funding. Staff worked with applicants through the detailed application process, located

volunteers to assist with title research, and coordinated the contracts for estimation and scope creation, and construction. Repair or rehabilitation was completed on 27 houses in 1.5 years (October 2023 – March 2025).

An additional 5-7 houses are expected to be repaired in 2025 using approximately \$260,000 in 2024-2025 CDBG funding administered by Community Initiatives Division staff (Irma Duran and Lorena Escobar). It is anticipated that this smaller scale will enable more efficient program operation and quicker completion of the repairs.

CDBG funding of \$350,000 is being requested for the CDBG Home Repair and Rehabilitation Program for Fiscal Year 2025 -2026. Staff anticipates continued successful implementation of this program in future years, based on recent past experience. (Irma Duran and Lorena Escobar)

The applicant hereby assures and certifies with respect to this project or program, by the submission of this application, that the following are true statements:

- 1. It possesses legal authority to apply for the grant and to finance the proposed request; that a resolution, motion or similar action has been duly adopted or passed as an official act of the applicant's governing body, authorizing the filing of the application, including all understandings and assurances contained therein, and directing and authorizing the person identified as the official representative of the applicant to act in connection with the application and to provide such additional information as may be required.
