OVERVIEW

1. Summarize the program for which funding is being requested, the services it provides, and the clients it serves.

The San Marcos Youth Service Bureau, (YSB) is a community-based program for youth ages 11-17. The goal of the program is to prevent delinquency through providing a safe environment after school and during the summer days when teens are most at risk for troubling behaviors or injury. By creating healthy surroundings with university mentors and outside agencies, YSB provides tutoring, educational workshops, recreational activities, responsibilities, and volunteer opportunities. YSB strives to encourage education, respect and instill exceptional character in our future leaders, neighbors and citizens.

COMMUNITY NEED AND JUSTIFICATION -15 POINTS

Evaluation: documentation and justification of the need for the program in the City of San Marcos.

1. Describe in detail the need for this program in San Marcos.
YSB has been serving the community and its families for 50 years, free of charge. The need is more important as ever due to the expense of afterschool programs and summer programs. The living wage in the area leaves many households having to choose between healthy foods, affordable childcare, and affording basic needs for their

families. Parents often are forced to leave their children alone while they are at work. Parents often are unable to find affordable tutoring and are unable to help their teens with their homework. Low-income family benefits are being stripped away.

2. Has the need for this program been increasing in recent years?

Teens are increasingly isolated, interacting only through their phones. They show little interest in human contact and have little ability to interact appropriately with others. Covid has had a significant impact on socialization. The soft skills that young people need to become employable and successful have become scarce.

Financially speaking, it is and will continue to be more difficult for families to afford basic needs.

The San Marcos population continues to grow quickly.

YSB members continue to keep connected to YSB through volunteering in the communities where they live (booster clubs, team coaching, ongoing service with previous volunteer sites.)

 Our Board members schedule monthly meetings, substitute for the director to supervise the youth if needed, participate in community events such as summer in the park, local parades, and all fundraisers. They verbally promoted the program and have helped search for a new location and physically moved the agency, twice.
 They have provided auto repair and document destruction. One member has been a regular volunteer for over 19 years.

2. Briefly describe the number and role of volunteers in the program or agency's operation.

This current year has not ended. My volunteer records have been lost due to a computer failure.

During the Spring semester I had 16 volunteers who committed a minimum of 50 hours. Their main function was to mentor the youth and work on our main fundraiser. Many put in additional hours and recruited other individuals to help. They do help to keep records and develop a class to teach our youth.

The chili cookoff had a minimum of 154 working volunteers, this included 3 adult YSB volunteers from the past.

These numbers do not include the various volunteers who come to the program to educate and work with the youth or the previous semester.

Our volunteers are very resolute and will work hard to support YSB.

The organization with Margie Hernandez, later acquired their non-profit status in 1979. Judge Hernandez as well as Ms. Ollie Giles held Board Positions until just before their deaths.

PROGRAM STATUS

Please provide a written description of actions taken this period and how they helped achieve your program goals.

YSB has been doing well! We have youth attending from surrounding apartments, home schoolers, and youth who have followed us from the previous location. YSB is finding resources in the community who are supporting YSB financially and otherwise.

The youth have been connecting with volunteer activities that they enjoy including School Fuel, the Discovery Center, and the Lifelong Learning classmates.

We have been preparing a gardening location for the summer project, planting seeds and some potted plants for a bit of beautification.

The Interns we have received from the Criminal Justice and Social Work Departments have really made an impression on the youth.

Our fundraiser in February was cold but successful. Our Board of Directors continue to be supportive and are working hard.

Thank you for the support.

7/28/2024 Youth have been excited this summer. The Garden construction is still underway, as the rain has slowed the progress. Other than swimming in a spring fed pool/city pool, youth have gone on the glass bottom boats, the University Rec Center, the snake farm, enjoyed bowling, 2 movies, and worked at the discovery center. They have set goals for the summer, taken weekly art lessons at Centro and really worked on their communication skills. They have worked together as a team and have been kind to one another, meeting new friends with different abilities.

<u>10/23/24</u> Youth continued with the above lessons and activities through summer. The garden project is almost complete with the heat really impacting the progress of moving the type of dirt we have..... (River bottom), But we are close and have planted a few vegetables.

Our program drew to the point we needed to rent an additional vehicle to accommodate the transportation of youth. Volunteers were good at driving themselves. Additional Building space was needed at that point. Additional tables in the garden area were purchased to allow outdoor gathering, weather permitting.

School has started and we have fewer youth. Many are going to schools that are a distance away for needed assistance in their education. Youth that are mature enough are walking here afterschool. Our new Interns and volunteers are focusing on homework assistance. One student had gotten straight A's for the first time in his life. We have been participating in nature walks, gardening, social skills, and the importance of continuing your education (drop-out prevention). New mentorship relations are quickly being formed. We are currently considering a move to another office here, that will accommodate our growing population.

1/15/2025 YSB has moved into a larger suite next door. With just a few more days to complete the move we will continue to work on our annual fundraiser and orient our new TXST student volunteers and interns. Last semester's TXST students have been sorely missed be the kids. YSB has spent much of the months assisting with homework, celebrating Halloween, Thanksgiving and Christmas. We wrote holiday cards to local nursing home residents, harvested out first tomatoes and acquired 2 new laptops for homework assistance. YSB volunteers and staff have had to really stress the importance of continuing the members education and have provided workshops on the benefits of staying in school. Conversations continue on internet safety, the dangers of drugs

- Agreeing to respect the dignity and privacy of all persons affiliated with YSB; safeguarding the confidentiality of YSB's clients, staff, and volunteers.
- Complying with the provisions of YSB's Bylaws and working with the board to bring any areas of concern into compliance.

Fundraising/volunteer work

- Board members should consider YSB a philanthropic priority. So that YSB can credibly solicit contributions from foundations, organizations, and individuals, each Board member is expected to make an annual contribution to YSB at a personally meaningful level.
- Board Members are expected to make a good faith effort to support the fundraising goals of San Marcos Youth Service Bureau, which may include among other things, suggesting potential donors and contacting some, making calls and sending thank you letters, and actively engaging in planning and attending fundraising activities.
- In addition, Board Members are asked to do volunteer work at or on behalf of the YSB, as the need arises and the schedule permits.

Board terms/participation

- Board interest forms are accepted at any time. Board Members are elected in October to serve a two-year term and are eligible to serve for two full terms. If there is a vacancy on the board, the Board may choose to elect a replacement board member to complete an unexpired term.
- Board members must meet the Board meeting attendance requirements set forth in the Bylaws, attend an annual workshop and attend committee meetings. Any board member who misses three consecutive meetings without excuse becomes inactive and is eligible for removal from the board with written notice.

Service on the Board is without remuneration, except for administrative support, travel, and accommodation costs in relation to Board Members' duties.

Potential Problems

- 1. Over 15 million young students are unsupervised between 3 and 6 p.m. allowing:
- Increased youth accidents or injuries leading to higher chance of death
- Peak time for experimentation with alcohol, tobacco, drugs, and sex
- Increased violent crime and youth as victims of violent crime (60% higher during peak hours)
- 2. Lack of supervision for adolescents has been linked to:
- Lower GPA and achievement test scores
- Decreased social competence
- 3. Unsupervised youth during peak hours increases risk of teenage pregnancy.

Benefits of After-School Program

- 1. After-school programs meet the needs of their communities by serving the youth who are primarily of low income. They allow access to meals, resources for families, and provide an additional safe and supervised learning environment.
- 2. According to studies, afterschool programs promote positive academic, social, and emotional development.
- Higher grades (in math, English, and science) and GPAs for students in after school programs.
- 3. Research shows that what students do. during out-of-school hours can affect their success during the school day. Those in an after-school program show higher rates of school attendance.
