Budget Public Hearing and Vote



- Hold a public hearing on the budget
- Record vote on budget

Ratify Property Tax Revenue Increase



- Local Government Code 102.007(c)
 - Adoption of a budget that will require raising more property tax revenue than in the previous year requires a separate vote to ratify the property tax revenue increase
 - Total tax revenue increase is \$2,242,670
 - New property \$2,622,805
 - Revenue from new property is higher due to low reappraisal growth combined with multiple properties being removed from the tax roll
 - Required even though the tax rate is not increasing 5

Ratify Property Tax Revenue Increase



• Vote to ratify the property tax revenue increase

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Setting the Tax Rate (Cont.)



- Property Tax Code 26.05(b)
 - Sets forth the following requirements if the tax rate exceeds the no-new-revenue rate:
 - Record vote
 - Approved by at least 60 percent of City Council (5 members)
 - Motion to approve the ordinance must be made with specific language:

"I move that the property tax rate be increased by the adoption of a tax rate of 60.30¢, which is effectively a 0.6 percent increase in the tax rate."

This language is required even though the tax rate is not increasing

Tax Rate Public Hearing and Vote



- Hold a public hearing on the tax rate
- Record vote on tax rate
 - Motion made with specific language
 - Requires a minimum of five votes for approval
