




Assess recovery needs post-disaster




Needs Assessment – Disaster Impact

- Evaluation of disaster-related impacts
- Use the best available data
- At a minimum, must evaluate three core aspects of recovery:
 - Housing
 - Infrastructure



Needs Assessment – Resources Available

- Assess other assistance available, or likely to be available
 - -FEMA funds available for public infrastructure
 - -Insurance funds available for homeowner rehabilitation



Unmet Needs & Funding Priorities

- Disaster recovery resources are scarce
- Use CDBG-DR to meet critical, unaddressed needs
- Illustrate the connection between the recovery needs and funding allocation
 - These do not have to align/match



Federal Register Requirements

- 70% Rule: 70% of funds MUST serve Low,
 Moderate Income (LMI) populations
- BFE Rule: ANY Substantially or Severely Damaged unit receiving CDBG-DR funds MUST be elevated to 2 Feet OVER the Base Flood Elevation when all construction is complete
- Disaster Rule: Use of funds for any project MUST be attributable to the two floods





Develop a CDBG-DR Action Plan



CDBG-DR Action Plan

Plan to address unmet recovery needs through activities that:

- Are CDBG eligible (or received a waiver),
- Meet CDBG national objective
 - Serve Low to Moderate Income
 - Address Urgent Need
 - Alleviate Slum and Blight
- Address direct or indirect impact of disaster.





Establish Program Criteria

Within the Action Plan:

- Determine eligibility thresholds;
- Determine cost maximums;
- Determine methods of disbursement and;
- Develop additional programmatic criteria

Public Participation

Public Participation plan:

- Create a Website
- Engage the public with surveys
- Public meetings/briefings
- Include public participation plan in Action Plan for HUD
- Action Plan on review for 2 weeks
- Any comments addressed before sending to HUD

Implement CDBG-DR Action Plan



Evolving Recovery Needs

- Disaster recovery needs evolve over time, the needs assessment (and Action Plan) may need to be updated periodically
- Contact FEMA/SBA for additional unmet housing and business needs data
- Additional local data on unmet needs





Reassessment of Needs

Why?

- Changes in unmet needs of communities
- Recovery priorities have shifted over time
- New information as result of citizen participation process

How do grantees meet these needs?

- Recalibrate existing programs
- Develop new programs or projects





Action Plan Amendments

Non-substantial:

- HUD acknowledgement but no approval required
- No citizen participation requirements

Substantial:

- Similar process to Initial Action Plan approval
- Require HUD Approval to be effective/before can be implemented
- Citizen participation requirements
- HUD reviews using Substantial Amendment checklist


Housing Results

 - iii. NFIP payouts (number 1 need at this point)

2. Funds provided to date

- a. FEMA
- b. SBA
- c. NFIP not known yet, continuously being requested
- d. Volunteer Organizations
- e. Non-profit Organizations



- a. FEMA Project Worksheets and approved damage estimates
- Potential projects need to be
 Engineered and Environmentally
 Cleared

3. Funds provided

- a. FEMA
- b. City Insurance
- c. Other sources



Infrastructure Results

1. Numbers may change

a. Design and engineering of Projects – implementation activity, NOT done now

2. Eligible Activities

- a. Repair of impacted facilities
- b. Resiliency and Hazard Mitigation projects
 - Must benefit LMI
 - ii. Must eliminate or reduce chances for repetitive loss
 - iii. Must be located within most impacted areas, or areas that would affect the impacted areas

Economy Results

- Very low damage and loss across City
- 2. SBA provided assistance
 - 15 loans, approx \$3.5M
- 3. Job losses negligible



Hazard Mitigation Activities

- Refine list of potential projects
- Need to develop Hazard Mitigation plan
- 3. Projects will need to ensure:
 - Disaster applicability;
 - Ability to reduce or eliminate repetitive loss;
 - c. Benefit to LMI population

Connection to Action Plan

Recommended breakdown by Category

Administration: 5%

Planning: 15%

• **Housing:** 50%

Infrastructure: 30%

- Hazard Mitigation activities may occur under all Categories
- Amounts can be changed and amended as actual programs and projects are developed
- No matter what, 70% of funds MUST benefit LMI

Connection to Action Plan

- 1. Eligible activities may be focused under Housing and Infrastructure
- 2. Hazard Mitigation activities may be cross-cutting
- 3. Activities most likely to have programs developed:
 - a. Repair/Buyout/Elevation of housing;
 - b. Repair of critical infrastructure; and
 - c. Development of HM and resiliency projects to eliminate repetitive loss

 Plan
- August 19 Draft Action
 Plan submitted for Public
 Comment
- September 2 Comment period closed
- September 6 Council
 Workshop to be briefed
 on Comments and
