Please allow this memo to detail the recommendation of the City's evaluation committee for The Normandy Group to be awarded the contract for Federal Lobbying Services for the City of San Marcos. Our purchasing department coordinated a very successful process that included written presentations from three relevant firms. In the end, the attached list detailing the nearly \$100 million in Federal Funding that Normandy has helped the City attain since 2008 set them apart from the remaining firms.
